GDC Standard 1 Put patient's interest first

Standard 1.5 You must treat patients in a hygienic and safe environment

1.5.1 You **must** find out about the laws and regulations which apply to your clinical practice, your premises and your obligations as an employer and you must follow them at all times. This will include (but is not limited to) legislation relating to:

- the disposal of clinical and other hazardous waste
- radiography
- health and safety
- decontamination
- medical devices



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GDC Standards 7

- 7.3.1 You must make sure that you know how much continuing professional development (CPD) activity is required for you to maintain. your registration and that you carry it out within the required time.
- 7.3.2 You should take part in activities that maintain update or develop your knowledge and skills. Your continuing professional development (CPD) activity should improve your practice. For more information, see the GDC's advice on CPD.
- Disinfection and Decontamination: GDC recommend that you do at least five hours in every CPD cycle.

Care Quality Commission (CQC)


- The commission was established as a single, integrated regulator for England's health and adult social care services by the Health and Social Care Act 2008.

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Reason for outbreaks


- Rapid population growth

- Environmental degradation




Reason for outbreaks


- Improved transportation, leading to easier spread of disease

- Poor disease control and disease prevention






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Your Role As An Infection Control Lead It is essential that all staff involved in decontamination are suitably trained and have their roles and responsibilities defined.

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IPC Policy Contents of an IPC Policy: Blood-borne virus transmission. Sharps injury. Decontamination and storage of instruments. Cleaning, disinfection and sterilisation procedures for instruments. Clinical waste disposal. Hand hygiene. (continued)

IPC Policy Contents of an IPC Policy (continued): Decontamination of new reusable instruments. Local PPE Policy. Management of dental instruments. Recommended disinfectants to be used within the practice. Spillage procedure. Environmental cleaning procedure, including methods and frequency.
